Whereas the Ministry of Natural Resources and Forestry (MNRF) is planning to post a draft

Species at Risk (SAR) Guide to the Environmental Registry for 28 species; and

Whereas the MNRF has failed to consult and work with affected stakeholders and forestry dependent communities on the development of the draft SAR guide; and Whereas municipal leaders have consistently requested the MNRF complete and share with municipalities socio-economic impact analysis on all policy impacting forestry; and

Whereas MNRF has conducted analysis for one prescription, caribou, and the analysis clearly demonstrates that mills will close; and

Whereas there has been no analysis of the cumulative socio-economic impact of all SAR rules contained within the guide (prescriptions) of multiple species; and Whereas Ontario has world-class legislation, the Crown Forest Sustainability Act (CFSA), which provides balanced and sustainable forest management; and Whereas the Endangered Species Act's (ESA) mandate of the protection and recovery of individual species at risk conflicts with the multi-species and multi-value approach of the CFSA, threatening forest sustainability; and

Whereas government in 2007 committed to realizing CFSA equivalency to the ESA, acknowledging that the under the CFSA, the forest sector Whereas government in 2007 committed to realizing CFSA equivalency to the ESA, acknowledging that the under the CFSA, which provides balanced and sustainable forest management and

Whereas the endangered Species Act (ESA) mandate of the protection and recovery of individual species at risk conflicts with the multi-species and multi-value approach of the CFSA, threating forest sustainability: and

Whereas even under a Section 55 Rules in Regulation "exemption", the forest sector must implement SAR rules (prescription); and

Whereas if the government continues to implement flawed ESA policy, mills will close, jobs will be lost, and forestry dependent communities will be decimated and

Further be it resolved that with respect to caribou, the Government of Ontario immediately modify Ontario's proposed caribou prescription by moving the caribou range north to reflect animal collaring data, moving away from the national 35% disturbance threshold, and acknowledging that other factors are threatening caribou recruitment and survival; and

Further be it resolved the Government of Ontario support its forest sector and the 175,000 hardworking men and women, directly and indirectly, who live in communities in every region of the province by asking the Government of Canada to postpone the October 5, 2017 deadline for completing plans and acknowledging recovery could require timeframes in excess of 50 to 100 years; and

Further be it resolved the Government of Ontario leave no worker, region or family behind by ensuring provincial policy supports at a minimum, current forestry operations and does not reduce the forest sector and its employment to a seasonal activity; and

Further be it resolved the Government of Ontario extend the current Section 55 Regulation (exemption), which currently expires on June 30, 2018, for another 5 years recognizing that

the CFSA ensure that all forest management in Ontario provides for all 3 pillars of sustainable development – economic, social and environment; and

Further be it resolved that a copy of this resolution be forwarded to the Honourable Kathleen Wynne, Premier of Ontario; the Honourable Kathryn McGarry, Minister of Natural Resources and Forestry; and the Federation of Northern Ontario Municipalities. c) Ontario Good Roads Association

And therefore be it resolved that the Council for the Town of Latchford hereby supports the Federation of Northern Ontario Municipalities (FONOM) and calls upon the Government of Ontario to permanently delay the posting of the made-in-Ontario Species at Risk (SAR) Guide which contains prescriptions (rules) for 28 species by 2 years.

#### Mayor's Report, August 17, 2017

#### **Latchford Control Dam**

Communications have been initiated with Kevin Radford and Judith Bennett regarding both land acquisition and local dam operation. With respect to land, the next step is to identify the areas of interest to the municipality and adjacent land owners, indicate same on a map then proceed with discussions with Harpreet Gill and Judith. The latter has indicated in an email that federal property issues and transfers are governed by specific policies and directives issued by Treasury Board Secretariat so that tells us it will not be a quick turnaround.

The local operation discussion will also involve Judith and John Ikonomopoulos so I am suggesting that we prepare a draft proposal utilizing the scenario that was provided by Kevin Radford whereas we enter into a lease of the new dam over a specific period of time whereby PSPC remunerate the Town of Latchford annually the amount they presently incur for operating the dam with an inflation factor incorporated. Under the envisioned lease PSPC would continue to own the dam, be responsible for maintenance and replacement as well as all liability for the dam.

#### **ONTC Land Acquisition**

EXP has been provided with a map of the area of interest for an industrial park and a request to delineate an area of 30 to 40 acres that could be serviced from our existing environmental services north of Marcotte Ave. This defined area will then be presented to the ONTC so as to pursue its acquisition by the Town. It would be imprudent to do an actual survey of the area until we get a better understanding of what the proposed cost of the area would be.

As EXP has just moved offices up Whitewood to the former MTO building, I am to meet with them again next week to review.

#### **Natural Gas Services**

As included in tonight's meeting package, I have assembled letters of support from a variety of interested parties for natural gas. Further, following an article in the North Bay Nugget indicating Union Gas had polled the residents of Astorville for an indication of support for natural gas services, I queried as to whether that would be beneficial for Latchford's application. He responded that, "We used your municipal resolution, previous advocacy on the issue and letters of support as a demonstration of municipal support. No intent to conduct any polling at this time, and we're confident that the application is a good one as we submitted."

#### **Mining Exploration Activities**

Tri Origin Exploration, as mentioned at the last meeting, have wrapped up their early season exploration west and south of Latchford and their Geologist indicated an interest in once more renting our arena floor for core logging. Since then, a release dated yesterday indicates that they have a significant budget allotted to return to thus area and I have attached the release for your information.

# TRI ORIGIN'S FIELD PROGRAM RETURNS ENCOURAGING RESULTS AT SOUTH ABITIBI GOLD & BASE METAL PROPERTY

Aurora, Ontario- Tri Origin Exploration Ltd (TSX-V:TOE) ("Tri Origin" or the "Company") is pleased to announce that reconnaissance geological mapping and sampling has been completed at a portion of the Company's large property holding along the south margin of the Abitibi Greenstone Belt in the Cobalt-Temagami region of Ontario. This work is conducted on behalf of a gold and base metal exploration Alliance entered into between Tri Origin and Sumac Mines Ltd. ("Sumac") a subsidiary of Sumitomo Metal Mining Co. Ltd. ("Sumitomo").

Geological mapping, prospecting and sampling was conducted throughout Target Area 2 ("TA-2"), the second regional area to be investigated by the Alliance. Rock sampling verified historic gold showings and mineral occurrences and identified new occurrences which warrant further work. Results for 177 grab samples of both Proterozoic sedimentary and Archean volcanic rock assayed for gold by Tri Origin have been received to date. Of these 11 were greater than 100 ppb and 2 of these were greater than 1,000 ppb with a best result of 2,504 ppb (2.5 grams of gold per tonne). Ninety two of the 177 samples were also analysed for a variety of base metals and trace elements. Of the 92 samples, copper values were over 100 ppm in 37 samples and 10 of these were over 1,000 ppm with a highest value of 9,493 ppm (0.95%). Nickel was greater than 100 ppm in 28 samples and 7 of these were greater than 1,000 ppm with a highest value of 6,915 ppm (0.69%). Zinc was greater than 100 ppm in 30 samples with the best result being 1,023 ppm (0.1%). Cobalt was also significantly anomalous with 15 samples returning values greater than 100 ppm and, of these, 3 were greater than 1,000 ppm with the highest value 2,465 ppm (0.25%).

TA-2 covers a 15 kilometre long trend of poorly mapped, prospective volcanic rocks of the southern Abitibi greenstone belt. Results of Tri Origin's geological investigations indicate that Archean volcanic rocks occupy a larger area than was previously thought. Approximately 50% of this area is covered by younger sedimentary rocks of Proterozoic age. These Proterozoic rocks have only received a cursory amount of surface prospecting. More importantly, there is no evidence of previous exploration of the underlying, covered Abitibi greenstone belt. Historic mineral occurrences located within the exposed parts of the Abitibi have not been evaluated since the 1970's. This is, in part, due to a land caution and exploration moratorium covering much of the area for almost 30 years. Tri Origin's prospecting uncovered new mineral occurrences and undrilled "VTEM" airborne EM anomalies were detected during a survey flown by the Alliance during 2015 and 2016. The newly identified extensions of the metalliferous Abitibi Greenstone Belt under Proterozoic cover represent high-priority target areas.

Results of mapping and prospecting conducted by Tri Origin and the abundance of mineral occurrences at TA-2 provide incentive to evaluate this regionally extensive, covered terrain. The Alliance is currently evaluating recommendations for the next phase of work at TA-2. It is anticipated that the next phase of this program will consist of geophysical surveying to delineate and prioritize anomalies for diamond drilling. Shareholders will be informed of the plans for follow-up geophysical surveying and commencement of the program on approval by the Alliance management committee.

Sumac is funding Alliance activities to a maximum total expenditure of C\$4.5 million. The current field work was the first part of a 2017 work program that has a pre-drilling budget of \$424,000.

Alliance activities within the southern Abitibi Greenstone Belt provide a fully-funded opportunity for Tri Origin to capitalize on its strategy of identifying and acquiring prospective, district-scale properties in well-mineralized mining areas and advancing these properties toward making new discoveries.

Tri Origin is pleased to participate with Sumac in its mineral exploration efforts and values Sumac's contributions to this Alliance. Sumitomo, Sumac's parent company, is a Japanese firm engaged in gold and base metals mining, smelting and refining, manufacturing of semiconductor and advanced materials and other business.
