From the kitchen of Diana

Best Carrot Cake (Yield: One 9" cake)

We may all have our own expectations or preferences as to what qualifies as being the Best Carrot Cake, but this one is definitely my favourite. There's a little extra work in doing the Buttermilk Glaze which goes on top of each cake layer while still warm in the pans, but it I'm convinced it is worth the effort. And when covered and filled with Cream Cheese Frosting this cake is perfectly delicious.

2 cups all-purpose flour
2 teaspoons baking soda
1/2 teaspoon salt
2 teaspoons ground cinnamon
3 large eggs
2 cups sugar
3/4 cup vegetable oil
3/4 cup buttermilk
2 teaspoons vanilla extract
2 cups grated carrots
1 (8-ounce) can crushed pineapple, drained
1 (3 1/2-ounce) can flaked coconut (or from a package)

1 cup chopped pecans or walnuts Buttermilk Glaze (recipe follows cake recipe) Cream Cheese Frosting (recipe follows cake recipe)

Preheat oven to 350°F. Line 3 (9-inch) round cakepans with wax paper; lightly grease and flour wax paper. Set pans aside.

In one mixing bowl, stir together first 4 ingredients.

In another bowl, beat eggs and next 4 ingredients at medium speed with an electric mixer until smooth.

Add flour mixture, beating at low speed until blended. Fold in carrots and next 3 ingredients.

Pour batter into prepared cakepans. Bake at 350°F for 25 to 30 minutes or until a wooden pick inserted in center comes out clean. Drizzle Buttermilk Glaze evenly over layers(I poke holes with a thin round skewer in cake layers before drizzling on glaze.); then cool in pans on wire racks 15 minutes. Remove from pans, and cool completely on wire racks.

Spread Cream Cheese Frosting between layers and on top and sides of cake. Buttermilk Glaze

1 cup sugar 1 1/2 teaspoons baking soda 1/2 cup buttermilk 1/2 cup butter or margarine 1 tablespoon light corn syrup 1 teaspoon vanilla extract Bring first 5 ingredients to a boil in a large Dutch oven over medium-high heat. Boil, stirring often, 4 minutes. Remove from heat, and stir in vanilla. Cream Cheese Frosting 1/2 cup butter or margarine, softened 1 (8-ounce) package cream cheese softened 1 (3-ounce) package cream cheese, softened 1 (16-ounce) package powdered sugar 1 1/2 teaspoons vanilla extract

Beat butter and cream cheese at medium speed with an electric mixer until creamy. Add powdered sugar and vanilla extract; beat at high speed 10 seconds or until smooth.
