



They were neither negative nor positive to the idea but did advise that we would have to approach the Director of Power Generation for PSPC for discussion. Despite my advanced age and my many years of participating in municipal government I never fail to be amazed by how the bureaucracy can inflate itself with so many of these seemingly one off positions? Unfortunately the game has to be played by their rules no matter how inane they may make them. With my cynical attitude towards some segments of senior government I guess retirement from small town politics for me is timely. I really didn't need any other reason than having to participate in Zoom meetings, meetings which are often organized for seemingly no other reason than to justify the meeting organizers working from home.

I have to share that I am very disappointed with the direction the Province is headed in with respect to Covid monitoring and reporting. With my wife and I having recently recovered from it, I was amazed to find that there is no need, or means, to report to anyone if you are infected with Covid. By all indications it is more rampant than in previous waves yet we are resorting to reporting hospitalizations rather than revealing true infection rates. I find all of this very misleading to those of us who are concerned about spreading it or being infected with Covid. I am among the many that continue to wear our masks when in public and I think it will be a while before that changes.

The goodies sure seem to be flowing from the government of the day prior to the June election. Refund cheques for license plate stickers have been showing up in mail boxes and they have announced that they are going to lower the provincial gas tax for a six month period but not until the election is over? I would almost think that is a bit of an incentive to vote for Doug and company for fear of losing that plum should another party be elected?

Due to my being infected with Covid it was necessary to postpone our meeting of the Communities of the Montreal River with respect to a hydro generating facility being developed at the Latchford Control Dam but we hope to hold it in early April.

My favourite French Canadian Tortière recipe that I have had around since the early 1980's.

TOURTIÈRE

(Makes two double crust 9-inch pies)

2 pounds ground pork
1/2 half pound ground veal
1-1/2 cups hot water
1-1/2 teaspoon salt
1/4 teaspoon pepper
1 large onion chopped
1 sprig celery leaves*
1/2 teaspoon allspice
Dash cloves
1 large potato, peeled

Double Basic pastry recipe using Tenderflake Lard

** Note: If I don't have celery leaves, I decrease salt to 1 teaspoon and add half a teaspoon of celery salt. Also, I use a bit of the excess fat from the cooked meat as a base to make some gravy.*

Once the cooked cooled meat mixture goes in the pie shell, spoon a little gravy on top of the meat mixture.

If it needs moisture before covering it with pastry. Once baked, serve with remaining gravy. Combine pork, veal, hot water, salt, pepper, onion, celery leaves, allspice and cloves in a heavy saucepan.

Bring to a boil, turn down heat, cover and cook gently for half an hour, stirring occasionally. Add whole peeled potato and continue cooking gently for an hour. (potato will soak up excess fat)

Discard potato and celery leaves. Cool meat mixture. (It should be thick but still moist.) Heat oven to 375 degrees.

Line two 9-inch pie plates with pastry. Fill each with half the meat mixture. Cover with remaining pastry, seal edges well and flute. Cut slits in tops to let steam escape

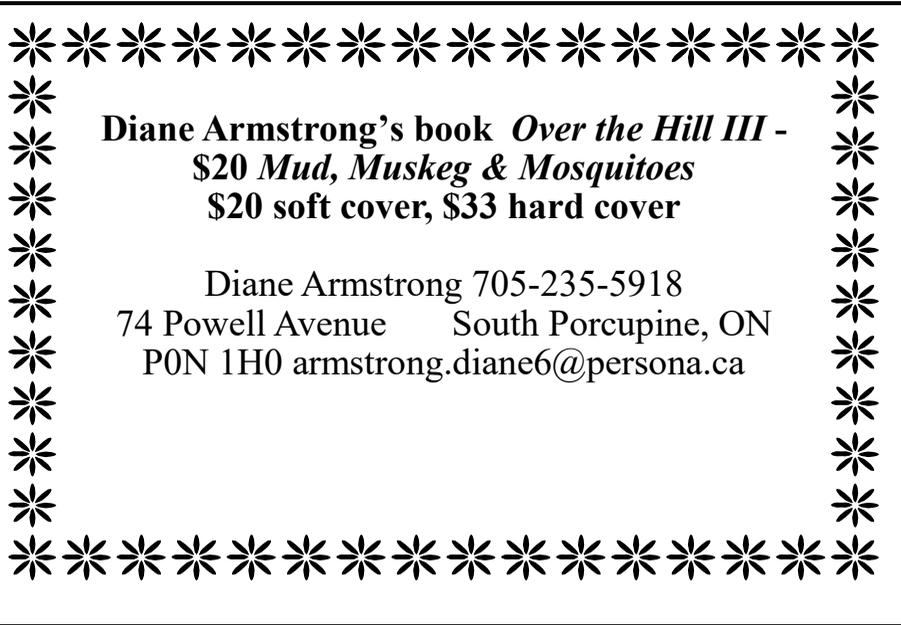

Fire department news

Spring is here! The Latchford Volunteer Fire Department would like to remind the residents and visitors of Latchford of a few April safety tips for spring clean-up.

When cleaning out basements, garages, sheds, and other storage areas, it is important to keep stairs and landings uncluttered and clear for safe evacuation in the event of an emergency. There should be clear, accessible pathways to every room, doorway, and window in your home and storage areas. Spring is a good time to start decluttering and recycling, getting rid of some of winter's accumulated "things", such as old newspapers, boxes, magazines and junk mail. These items can cause unnecessary clutter and can be a hazard as they ignite and spread fire quickly.

If you have not used your barbeque and outdoor cooking appliances throughout the winter, it is a good idea to clean them out and ensure they are working properly prior to cooking with them. Make sure to check outdoor electrical outlets and other electrical appliances for damage and to ensure they are working properly prior to use.

Spring is also a good time to do some safety checks and emergency preparations, such as: checking your smoke and carbon monoxide detectors, making sure your address numbers are up and visible from the street, and checking windows to ensure they open and close properly, in case they are needed as an exit. It is a good idea to prepare for storm related outages, making sure your flashlights and other battery-operated devices have charged batteries. Hav-

ing extra spare batteries on hand is always a good idea.

Spring brings the thawing and break-up of our lakes, rivers and ponds. Make sure to keep a close eye on children and pets around the newly open waterways.
